

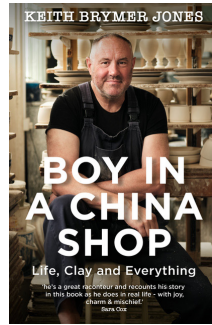

Summer Land in conversation with Michael Duffy

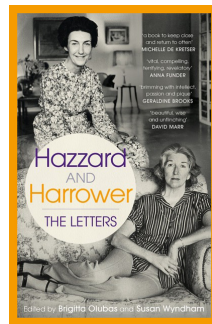
Listeners to the hit podcast *Who the Hell is Hamish?* know some of the story of Tracy Hall who discovered that 'Max', the man she dated for two years, was an infamous scammer who vanished with her life savings. *The Last Victim* written by Tracy with Summer Land tells the full story.



Summer Land is an author, writer, keynote speaker who moved to Mudgee from the US in 2010. Her books include *Summerlandish: Do as I Say, Not as I Did*, and *I Now Pronounce You Husband and Expat*. She has co-authored and ghostwritten over ten books, including *Acting Up* (Lynne McGranger), *A Joyful Life* (Rosemary Kariuki), and *Aussie Ark* (Tim Faulkner).



Susan Wyndham is a journalist, writer and former literary editor of *The Sydney Morning Herald*. She is co-editor with Brigitta Olubas of *Hazzard and Harrower: The letters*, a collection of correspondence between the two Australian writers.



Jamelle Wells is an ABC television and radio news-reader and the senior court reporter for New South Wales, commenting on courts and legal affairs on programs including Australian Story. Over almost two decades she has covered some of Australia's highest profile cases including the criminal trials of schoolteacher Chris Dawson, the inquiries into the convictions of Kathleen Folbigg for killing her four children, the criminal trials of former Labor Ministers Eddie Obeid and Ian Macdonald, the murder trials of Keli Lane and Gordon Wood, Australia's longest running terrorism trial, the Sydney Siege inquest, and the inquest into the disappearance of William Tyrrell.

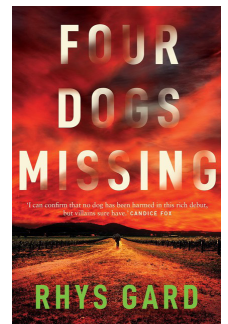
Jamelle Wells in conversation with Rhys Gard

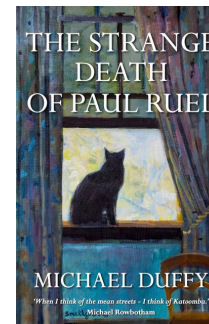

Discover a different side of Mudgee and the Blue Mountains with Mudgee-based crime writer and chef Rhys Gard (*Four Dogs Missing*) and multi-talented writer Michael Duffy whose *Bella Greaves* series of crime novels is set in the Blue Mountains.



Michael Duffy writes the Bella Greaves series of crime novels set in the Blue Mountains, where he lives. He is a public servant and a founder of the BAD Sydney Crime Writers Festival. He will be speaking about the three Bella Greaves books *The Problem with Murder*, *The Man in Black* and *The Strange Death of Paul Ruel*.



Rhys Gard is a writer and a chef. Between careers, he studied English and Film at the University of New South Wales. He has worked as a journalist, marketer, wine writer and restaurateur. He lives in Mudgee. *Four Dogs Missing* is his first novel. He is also one of the organisers of the Mudgee Readers' Festival.
